KEITH EDWARD HAWKINS 1948 - 2023

Keith attended St Mark, usually for the Tuesday service, before Covid restrictions. He took part in confirmation classes at St. Mark and was confirmed at the Abbey. He was born and lived his early years in Nursling and later in North Baddesley where he cared for his disabled wife. Keith was a very private, gentle person. Sadly he suffered with depression all his life which



became ever more debilitating after his wife's death. He struggled valiantly with his condition but the time during the pandemic was difficult for him. Over time he opened up and prior to Covid he went with Victoria and others on a pilgrimage to Israel. Beforehand, Keith was apprehensive and concerned at how it would go, but on his return he was a changed person mentioning the experience often.

His funeral at St Boniface Church Nursling, where he had been a regular worshipper, took place on a glorious and gracious spring day. Appropriately one of the hymns was "Morning has broken" and the reflective and other music by Ralph Vaughan Williams. His family and long-standing friends remembered him with fondness and respect. Friends of Chapel Wood

May is a lovely time of year to wander through Chapel Wood. Everything is fresh. You can almost stand and watch the newly formed leaves of the oak and beech trees unfurl. When they are caught in the sunlight, they display such a vibrant green, which is only really seen at this time of year.



It makes a super backdrop for a springtime working party in the sunshine.

This month we had two primary tasks. The first was to repair the fences along the north-east boundary with the Forestry Commission part of Ampfield Wood. Over the years the posts had rotted and been the subject of one temporary repair after another. It had all become a bit scruffy.

There is now so much foot traffic through this area, both in and out of Ampfield Wood, as walkers seek to create fresh routes, that we felt the role played by the fence had gradually changed. What we wanted was a clearly defined boundary rather than a fence that would try to prevent the passage of people through it. For that reason, after we had replaced the posts, we added just a single strand of wire rather than two. At least that might lessen the need for walkers to carry wire cutters!

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The second job was to try to reduce the quantity of bracken growing in the wood. In the past, we have followed the time-honoured method known colloquially as ‘slashing at the fiddle stage’. However, this year we thought we would try a change. We decided to pull them out, roots and all. We cleared the glade and the bonfire area. We will see. Doubtless by June, there will be another batch to be dispatched.

On a slightly more serious note, we understand Ampfield has been invaded by the oak processionary moth. This is a notifiable pest that lives predominantly in oak trees. Although the trees suffer little long-term damage, the hairs on the caterpillars can be dangerous for humans suffering from lung problems, e.g. asthma. We are corresponding with the Forestry Commissions who ask that we should advise them if we see anything.



The Friends of Chapel Wood is a group of keen volunteers who look after Chapel Wood, the Ampfield community wood that surrounds St. Mark's church. New recruits are always welcomed, so if you fancy the idea of joining some like-minded neighbours for a few hours once a month, just turn up in the St.

Mark's car park at 09:45 on the second Saturday of every month.





Where have all the insects gone?

Is it down to my failing eyesight or is something more sinister going on, but where have all the insects gone from our gardens and woods? Turning a garden sod or two I expected to see a few earth worms but none there were. When moving some heavy stones, I expected sight of a milli or centipede scurrying desperately to return to the ground's warm, dark inside cupboards. They were empty. Gone too are the days when motoring along the ways and lanes of the Test and Itchen valleys and windscreen and radiator grill would quickly paste with early season mayfly. At night moths were attracted by headlights.

I read of Mrs Tiggywinkle in a bedtime story to our grandchildren and how prickly her prickles were. Sadly, it means nothing to them for they've not yet seen a hedgehog in their gardens. Where have the frogs, toads and caddisfly gone from the ponds of our youth which we'd visit with net and jam jar? What is the point of taking children for a nature ramble promising excitement if there is nothing to be seen? Even the number of birds and their song seem fewer, but that may be a result of losing one's hearing aid. Global warming can't surely be the cause of every change that's going on?

This is borne out by recent report from the Natural History Museum following a new study by the conservation charities Buglife and the Kent Wildlife Trust. The research indicates that the UK's flying insects have declined by 60% over the last 20 years due to rising temperatures and fragmented habitats. That we can, from our own casual observations, relate to these reports must be a "call to arms" to do whatever is possible in our own gardens and spheres of influence to halt this decline for the consequences of not doing so will be detrimental to us all.




The Three Hares

One strange symbol which can be found is that of three hares chasing each other in a circle. The hares are joined by their ears, which form a triangle at the centre of the design, each hare seeming to have two ears, yet between them they share only three ears. This ancient symbol is the subject of a study by three British researchers who have come to realise how widespread the image is, stretching across diverse religions and cultures, many centuries and many thousands of miles. It is part of the shared medieval heritage of Europe and Asia (Buddhism, Islam, Christianity and Judaism), possibly brought to Europe via the old trade routes from the East.

In Britain the hares are mostly found in churches, especially in Devon around Dartmoor. At least 17 churches in Devon have at least one roof boss showing the symbol of the hares. But the symbol can sometimes be found in medieval stained glass, as at Long Melford, Suffolk, or floor tiles, as at Chester Cathedral, but most commonly as roof bosses, as in most of the examples pictured.

On the Continent, France Germany and Switzerland have many examples, the motif even being embossed on a bell at Kloster Haina. The oldest known examples can be seen painted on the ceilings of Buddhist cave temples in China, dating from as early as the 6th. century AD. They also appear in southern Russia, Iran and elsewhere.

What does it mean? The hare appears often in world mythology and from ancient times has had divine associations. It was perhaps a symbol of femininity and fertility, being placed often close to a green man, another ancient motif representing fertility. Linking the symbol to the Trinity seems to be a much later association, but certainly illustrates the idea of three in one.

The Kitchen Garden - G4G

Another year in the kitchen garden is gradually coming into shape. Most of the new planting has now been done – the only outstanding seeds are runner beans, and they will be sown this weekend. It is very agreeable to be able to walk out into the kitchen garden early in the morning and see what has changed. The recent spell of warm sunny weather is certainly have an impact after all the rain we experienced earlier in the year.

After such a flurry of activity throughout the early spring, it seems strange to find that there are relatively few things that need our attention at the moment. The most obvious are the three 'W's;

Weeding Watering Watching

Weeds may or may not look attractive, depending on your point of view, but they certainly compete for nutrients and for water. So, they are best removed as soon as possible. Equally, it is important that new plants do not dry out, so a regular watering routine is a good thing to establish. Some care should be taken not to drown the sources of future little pieces of enchantment, but they should not be allowed to wilt as this can damage their little cells.

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The third of the 'W's, watching, is also worth incorporating in a regular routine. We are looking for evidence of pests and diseases. Like most things, the sooner you can spot something, the less likely it will do any long-term damage. The RHS website has a very good section on this sort of thing. If anything is obviously damaging the plants., it is probably worth dealing with fairly ruthlessly. I can remember enjoying watching mice nibble broad beans, picking them and taking them back to their larder. Result - good entertainment but zero broad bean!

In the greenhouse, there is the need for similar routines, little slugs and snails are good at playing hide and seek. It is worth remembering the temperatures will tend to be hotter and growing medium will dry out faster. It is also important to get a good flow of air through glass houses so vents should be kept open as much as possible. It is not long before regular feeding will become necessary. In the meantime, keep all plants well supported on canes or wire.

Thought for the Month - Keep on running

What were you doing on 23rd April this year? Apart from it being St. George's Day and attending church, I was watching the London Marathon, glued to my phone and tracking some of my friends, who were running it. If you have never experienced the tracking app, you can follow people's progress in real time; I find it so exciting, seeing their progress as each mile is munched up! I can vividly remember watching the first London Marathon, in 1981, on TV. I was 16 and totally in awe of people being able to run 26.2 miles, an impossible task as far as I was concerned, but what made it most memorable was that the elite men's race was won by 2 people: Dick Beardsley and Inge Simonsen, they were neck-a-neck and ended by crossing the line, holding hands; I was feeling very emotional about the whole affair anyway, but that just finished me. Since then, the London Marathon has held a very special place in my heart.

Fast forward to circa summer 2017, and after a few failed attempts to take up running myself, I decided to embark on the "Couch to 5K" plan; basically it is a phone app which coaches you to build from a complete novice, to being able to run for 30minutes, over 9 weeks. You start by just running for 60 seconds, with walks in between, and gradually increasing. Well, completing this pro-



gramme - it took me about 6 months, with "life" getting in the way (including 6 weeks with a broken elbow) and I still can't do 5km in 30 minutes - literally changed my life. In January 2018, I could run about 3km (just under 2 miles) but felt I needed to challenge myself, so signed up for the Great South Run, a 10-mile run, in Southsea, in October of the same year; it was difficult but, I did it! At the time I remember thinking, that's it, I have achieved 10 miles, about 7 miles more than I ever dreamt I could do, but ...yes you've guessed it, I have just kept running ever since.

I now run with a club – the Halterworth Harriers – during lock-downs I think it kept me sane, and in January 2021 I covered 110 miles, and that included a half marathon on my birthday. I have completed the Great South 3 times in all, and this year completed my first half marathon event in Southampton.

I am now 58 and fitter than I have ever been. But it's not just about fitness, running has given me so much more. A friend asked me recently what I think about when I run. Honestly, to start with it's "why am I doing this?" as my breath turns from normal to gasping, but once that settles down, I think about very little. I am often reminded of my dear dad, who was a great sportsman in his youth, and then an energetic spectator as he got older. I have great memories of sitting on his lap, watching sport on the TV, as a little girl, and so it is a great sadness that by the time I was running regularly, he had passed away. However, when out running I think about him watching me from that heavenly place and cheering me on; for my first event I had his photo printed on the inside of my t-shirt, so that he was next to my heart. I also spend time praying and imagining Dad and Jesus together, doing each step with me. Sometimes I have music, sometimes I don't, I just take in the beautiful countryside – I did once see a hare, a unique experience for me – and often when running up hills, I sing hymns in my head, Amazing Grace is a favourite. When I first started to achieve my "Couch to 5Km" milestones, running really boosted my confidence, in all areas of life, and that remains.



Life is not easy but God intended us to challenge ourselves. You might not be enthused to take up running but remember:
"I can do all this through Him who gives me strength."

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
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
