What does a PCSO do? I get lots of questions and there is some confusion around what the role of a PCSO (Police Community Support Officer) is. We do not arrest people and we do not carry any personal protective equipment. Our main role is to be part of the community. We deal with lower level activity which allows the Police Officers to get on with the more serious incidents. We deal with ASB (anti-social behaviour), offer reassurance, complete house to house enquiries, engage with our communities through beat surgeries which gives access to police and any other services who attend i.e. Bobby Van, Council and Councillors, NHW, etc. We search for missing and vulnerable persons and keep in touch with vulnerable children and older persons and ensure the relevant agencies have an up to date assessment of their needs and any concerns. We gather intelligence which helps us to understand what is going on in our communities and where we need to focus our attention. Every day is different so we are constantly surprised!

# **Neighbourhood Priorities**

Theft of catalytic converters: We have seen a rise in thefts of catalytic converters mainly from car parks such as National Trust properties and Gardens, such as Hilliers, as well as being taken whilst parked on driveways. As in my previous newsletters they are after the precious metals contained in them which are: platinum, palladium and Rhodium which are expensive. Honda Jazz and Civics, along with hybrid vehicles, especially the Toyota Auris and Prius appear to be the vehicles of choice. When parking up try to reverse into a space so that the exhaust is harder to get to. There are also kits which can be purchased through dealers, garages and on line.

Theft of number plates: We have started to also see a small rise in criminals taking number plates from cars. This is again happening in car parks (the same as the catalytic converters above). These are to be used in criminal activity. Please remain vigilant and call us if you see anything suspicious. We are working with those organisations where these incidents are taking place.

**SSAFA**: What is it? SSAFA (Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen and Families Association) is the Armed Forces charity. It is a UK wide charity that provides lifelong support to serving men and women and veterans from the British Armed Forces and their families and dependants. 

#### Interview with PC Tristan Pugh... What made you join the Police?

I had planned to join the RAF and was already a partially qualified pilot at age 16 but circumstances changed and I looked for a different career that would keep me engrossed, challenged and useful. I took a few nights out with Shirley police and felt that Police could fit that requirement. That was well over 20 years ago and I haven't looked back.

What has been the biggest change? The reduction in staff from 2010 has been very real and noticeable on the front line. This has reduced the amount we can do for the public, meaning more hard choices have to be made every day on who gets a police response and why, because we cannot service every call for service.

What has been your best success? Wow. Tough call. I like catching criminals. I also love riding my police bike and had many successful 'collars'. My best success is that I have trained over 250 officers in both Basic and Tactical cycling skills and those cycle officers have been leveraged over my career to catch even more!

What advice would you give yourself if you could go back in time to when you started? Relax, live in the moment. No regrets. Always follow your passions unapologetically (always doing the right thing!) – which is good, because that is what I have done ©
